NEW FACE, NEW DEBATE: A FEMALE JOINS THE OVUM TEAM

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he local Ovum Ball community was stunned this week when Coach Striker announced that newcomer Rayna Hadhaa would be joining the team's roster, making her the only girl to compete in the traditionally male-dominated sport.

While Coach Striker praised Rayna's determination and potential, not everyone welcomed the decision.
